(a) Director's Update to Trustees

i. Your Future Starts Now

On Tuesday, November 3, 2015, the District School Board of Niagara hosted the third annual technology conference for female students in grades 9-12. The "Your Future Starts Now" conference gave over 250 young women from across the DSBN the opportunity to meet, interact and learn from female professionals working in skilled trades. Through DSBN's Specialist High Skills Majors programs and Ontario Youth Apprenticeship opportunities, students are finding more ways than ever to prepare themselves for a rewarding career in the skilled trades.

ii. DSBN Pink Shirt (Every) Day

The DSBN Pink Shirt (Every) Day Kick-Off Campaign is taking place from November 16-20, 2015 during Ontario's Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week. The intent of this campaign is to engage schools in the process of embedding the theme of Pink Shirt Day regularly into the school calendar. Any day is an appropriate day to have a Pink Shirt Day throughout the school year, but DSBN will acknowledge February 24, 2016 as a unified DSBN Pink Shirt Day to celebrate each school's accomplishments towards a more positive school climate.

iii. Burst the Bubble for Autism

Students at Martha Cullimore Public School recently became more aware of the characteristics of people with autism as well as how they can be good friends and classmates to students with autism by participating in the Niagara Chapter of Autism Ontario's *Burst the Bubble for Autism* campaign.

iv. Take our Kids to Work Day

On November 4, 2015, DSBN sites hosted many students for "Take Our Kids to Work Day." This is an annual program in which grade 9 students are hosted by parents, friends, relatives and volunteers at their workplaces. The program supports career development by allowing students to explore the profession of their host for a full day and to experience a workplace environment.

v. Residential School Tour

On November 3, 2015, this event brought DSBN teachers and administrators to Six Nations for a guided tour of the Mohawk Institute Residential School and the Woodland Cultural Centre in Brantford. The tour was led by Dawn Hill who attended this residential school in the early 1960s. The tour shed light on some of the historical and contemporary issues faced by our FNMI students and their families.

vi. <u>Cultural Competency Training by Ontario Federation of</u> Indigenous Friendship Centres (OFIFC)

On October 16, 28 and 29, 2015, staff participated in full day workshops which provided a unique program designed to increase knowledge, enhance self-awareness, and strengthen the skills of those who work both directly and indirectly with First Nation, Métis and Inuit students and families. The goal for these sessions was to further develop individual competencies and promote positive partnerships. Teachers learned about terminology, diversity, aspects of colonial

1. Report of Grade 9 Mathematics

Superintendent McGregor provided a summary of the report. Superintendent McGregor highlighted DSBN results and gave examples of strategies that are being used in secondary schools to improve student achievement.

In response to a question, Superintendent McGregor clarified that the increase in results seen in special education students is a result of a culmination of a number of years work and the support around mathematics.

2. Board Improvement Plan for Student Achievement 2015-16

Superintendent McGregor and Superintendent Dickson guided trustees through the BIPSA, explained the data seen on each page, and highlighted strategies that have been successful in achieving student success.

In response to a question, Superintendent Dickson acknowledged the importance of parent involvement and listed some of the ways that parents can become involved.

In response to a question, Superintendent Dickson and Superintendent McGregor described some of the mental health initiatives and professional development opportunities available for staff in elementary and secondary schools.

In response to a question, Superintendent Dickson and Superintendent McGregor explained the strategies being used in schools that have contributed to an increase in results seen in English language learners.

a) Parent Involvement Committee Conference

Superintendent Reimer Friesen provided a summary of the Parent Involvement Committee Conference "Parent Power", which was held on November 4, 2015 at Eden High School.

Over 800 people attended this well organized event that included free childcare, a vendor fair, door prizes, and a choice of 17 sessions that ranged from Technology and Math, to Mental Health and Concussion Awareness. Session topics were generated from last year's parent feedback and it was DSBN staff, as well as outside organizations who generously donated their time and expertise to make the sessions possible.

Superintendent Reimer Friesen thanked staff and students at Eden High School for the use of their facility and for the many volunteers they provided to help make the event successful.

Trustee Helga Campbell commended Superintendent Reimer Friesen, Parent Involvement Committee Chair Lisa Mooney, and the volunteers that helped organize and run the conference.

b) Information Technology Initiatives Report

Director Hoshizaki introduced Chief Information Officer, Dino Miele, who provided a summary of the Information Technology Initiatives Report.

Dino Miele explained that school boards and the Ministry work together to make efficient use of resources and share operational best practices to support students and staff. Dino Miele shared examples of shared services solutions that the DSBN Information Technology Services Department is providing, which include Niagara Student Transportation Services, the Welland Public Library in Diamond Trail Public School, and Special Education software at Niagara Children's Centre.

DSBN is providing leadership in an initiative that will allow connection between data centers at DSBN, Niagara Health System, Niagara Region, Niagara Regional Police Services, Brock University, Niagara College, and Innovate Niagara.

Information Technology Initiatives Report

DSBN is also a key partner in implementing an initiative that furthers DSBN's ability to access and present rich and integrated data from the multiple data sources to increase effectiveness for evidence based decision making for staff and the Board.

These shared services and collaboration lay the ground work for achieving future savings by removing the duplication of resources, processes, and technology in the organizations.

In response to a question, Dino Miele explained that the software (Click) will allow the user to drill down the data and use note taking and portfolio capabilities to allow for both anecdotal evidence and data based evidence.

2. <u>Trustee Information Session</u>

There was no trustee information session.

3. Correspondence and Communication

Superintendent Courtois provided an update on the accommodation review process and reported that meetings have taken place with the Town of Pelham, the City of St. Catharines, and the Niagara Region. Farr Public School, and the next public meeting for the South Central St. Catharines Modified Accommodation Review will take place on December 2, 2015 at Glen Ridge Public School. 4. Trustee Communications and School Liaison

Students will be reproducing their play "Invisible Wounds", which is based on the writings of veteran Ed Brown from British Columbia who will be in attendance.
- (b) Trustee Keddy Scott reported that she attended the Grimsby Secondary School Honour Roll Ceremony last week. The key note speaker was a former Grimsby Secondary School student who designed the school logo 25 years ago.
- (c) Trustee Chase reported that she attended a 50th Anniversary celebration at Gainsborough Public School on November 7, 2015.
