# **MINUTES OF MEETING**

#### Welcome and Introductions: Role of Student Trustees & Senate

Karling and Samir welcomed the group and explained the role of the Student Trustees as well as the purpose of the Student Trustee Senate. Karling introduced Ms. Harrison, Ms. Oliverio, Ms. Santesso, Mrs. McGugan, Ms.MacKinnon and Trustee Sue Barnett to the senate.

### Welcome from the Director: Warren Hoshizaki

Warren Hoshizaki, Director of Education for the DSBN, greeted the Student Senate and welcomed them to their roles as Student Senate members for the 2016-17 school year. Mr. Hoshizaki shared information about his role and experience at the DSBN. He also highlighted the size and impact of DSBN as an organization. The senate was encouraged to use their voice and bring questions and concerns forward to their Student Trustees.

### Approval of the Agenda:

Stamford Collegiate Secondary School motioned the agenda be approved. Governor Simcoe Secondary School seconded the motion. Motion carried.

#### Approval of the Minutes:

Thorold Secondary School motioned that we approve the minutes, seconded by Beamsville District Secondary School. Motion carried.

## Icebreaker Game: Student Trustees

Karling and Samir lead an icebreaker game with the senate to encourage everyone to get to know one another.

#### Thoughts on Leadership and Balance: Ms. Harrison

Ms. Harrison spoke about her experience and her current role at DSBN. She described Student Voice and the importance of the senate's contribution to the Student Voice.

Ms. Harrison led an activity where students were asked to identify important Canadian and world figures, and then list the qualities that make these figures great leaders. Students were asked to reflect and journal, using their Student Trustee Senate Journal, on four leadership qualities a great leader would display and identify reasons to support those qualities. Student Senate members identified the following characteristics as those of a great leader: determined, approachable, confident, influential, honest, selfless, caring, brave, inspirational, lead by example and treat people equally.

Ms. Harrison discussed leading a balanced life and the importance of managing your commitments. She stressed the importance of saying no and taking time to rest. Ms. Harrison asked the senate members to reflect and journal their own leadership qualities and identify two areas they would like to work on this year.

Ms. Harrison spoke to the senate about Speak Up grants and encouraged students to apply for these grants to support student led and student voice initiatives in their schools.

#### Communication: Kim Yielding
